  - Open up the two flaps at the bottom of the paper. These flaps will become the hull (bottom) of the boat.
- 6. Form the Boat Shape:
  - Gently press the sides of the boat inward while pushing the bottom edges of the flaps together. This will help the boat take its shape. Flatten the boat out so it sits evenly.
- 7. Optional: Decorate Your Boat:
  - If you like, you can decorate your origami boat with markers, stickers, or even draw windows and a mast for a sail.
- 8. Float Your Boat:
  - To see if your boat floats, find a small container of water (like a basin or bathtub) and gently place your boat on the surface. Adjust the folds if needed to ensure it floats correctly.
