ADVENT REFLECTION

On this first Sunday of Advent, many of us wait in joyful anticipation—for Christmas, for families reuniting, and for our packages to arrive. Our Church reminds us with today's readings to redirect that eagerness towards Our Incarnate Lord.

In the Gospel, Christ promises the return of the Son of Man in glory amidst great trial and tribulation, and He calls us to constant vigilance. Yes, we look forward to Christmas during this season, but we also anticipate a day of such significance that Jesus prophecies "there will be signs in the sun, moon, and stars." Advent is about our grateful certainty that God fulfilled His promise to "raise up from David a just shoot," when Jesus Christ was born of Mary. That certainty also looks ahead in hope to when He will fulfill His promise to come again. Our hope is not rooted in wishful thinking or optimism. Our hope stems from our trust. We rely upon a God who has already won, who has demonstrated His infinite love by taking on our weakness and our flesh, dying for our sins, and opening the gates of Heaven to us. We look to Christmas day as a sign of the humble and immeasurable love of God, and we anticipate the second coming as the finale of God's perfect plan.

That said, Jesus's words in this Gospel are also a warning. The eager anticipation of this season carries with it a sense of vigilance and rigor. We must not grow complacent as we wait, nor should we confuse our confidence in God's mercy with an excuse to "become drowsy from carousing and drunkenness and the anxieties of daily life." Christ tells us to pray, now, daily, for the strength to stand before the Son of Man on that day of reckoning. So, we also enter a season of preparation, that we might make room in our hearts and our lives for Jesus Christ.

This Advent, let us wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior—both for the celebration of His birth and for His glorious return. + Bishop Schlert

The Diocese of Hamilton Office of Justice and Peace would like to extend an invitation to parishes, schools, and families, to participate in a Christmas Gift Bag Drive, in support of De Mazenod Door and its guests.

<u>What is it:</u>

- On Christmas Day, each guest that comes to the De Mazenod Door will receive a warm meal and Christmas gift bag, filled with socks, gloves, hat, scarf, snack and bottle of body wash.
- On New Years Day, each guest will receive a meal, and a \$10 Tim Horton's gift card.

These are important items that not only bring safety and comfort as the temperatures drop, but also care and hospitality to residents facing hardship.

Important Details

*Each gift bag will include the same combination of items – 2 pairs of socks, 1 pair of gloves, 1 scarf, 1 hat, and soap. We will specify sizes for your group.

*Donations should be clean and unworn. The bags must all be the same and will be provided to you.

*All Tim Horton's gift cards should be \$10.00 in value, not more or less, to ensure everyone receives the same gift. *These will be kept separate from the Christmas gift bags and given out on New Years Day.

*You can sign up to collect items for the Christmas gift bags, OR collect \$10 Tim Hortons gift cards, OR both.

*Volunteers can collect all their items and assemble bags themselves, OR collect their items and drop them off for assembly at the Chancery Office. Please communicate your intention to the Diocesan Office of Justice and Peace.

*Please ensure there is a volunteer designated to transport collected items to the Chancery Office by Dec. 13th.Please do not take donations directly to the De Mazenod Door, as they cannot store them.

*For groups interested in volunteering to assemble and fill the Christmas gift bags at the Chancery Office, please indicate this in your registration.

Groups who have collected donations earlier than Dec. 2nd can arrange an early drop-off by coordinating with the Diocesan Office of Justice and Peace.
